Principal Report - Newsletter Week 3 Term 4 2018

Term 4 has started with a flurry of activities to engage, stimulate and support our students.

One of the most significant events in the school life of a student is the HSC exams. This is the culmination of 13 years of schooling for the students. Our Year 12 students have been working hard to prepare for these exams and we continue to wish them well with their remaining exams. We have also had a significant celebration for our Aboriginal students who attended the Deadly Awards recently. Congratulations to all of our Aboriginal students, particularly those that received an award. Corrimal HS is extremely proud of your achievements.

Week 2 saw the first of this years transition days for Year 6 students. Students were able to engage in language, cooking, music and science classes. Speaking to the students, it was clear that they were all thoroughly enjoying their experiences. New friendships were formed and their understanding of a high school context was enhanced. There will be a further three orientation days over the next few weeks to ensure that all students get the opportunity to participate in all activities. Thank you to all of the Corrimal HS staff who provided opportunities, as well as to the Primary schools for supporting us.

This past Saturday saw the first in the next instalment of Working Bees to improve the Pleasance area at the school. Over 20 volunteers from the City Serve group turned up to assist Suzanne Groves and Phil Stephens from the school in making improvements to the space. These included the addition of pebbles into some gardens, painting tables, adding layers of decomposed granite to revamp some of the area. The group also spent time making improvements to a new coffee space located near the Pleasance as well as the addition of new motivational calligraphy quotes within the girls toilets.





At the end of Term 3, I challenged all staff to be educational risk takers and to ensure that they challenge students to be the same. I want all students to become responsible for their own learning, and become an active part of the education process. In order to facilitate this, I have allocated over \$65000.00 towards Innovation Grants. There were 37 Innovation submissions from staff, ranging from the purchasing of a new plasma cutter in the TAS department to allow for new types of work to be completed, to the Schoolyard Sisterhood program designed to promote and support our aspirational young women and encourage them to maintain their aspirations throughout high school and into their post school pathways.

This process involved staff planning and developing innovative ideas in order to change the way they teach, or how they support student learning. Progress on all of these grants will be monitored over the next year to gauge impact and outcomes. I am extremely excited about the future opportunities that these Innovation Grants will provide to our students.

This term also sees the commencement of an Attendance and Engagement program at the school. This program will be run by school staff and will be supported by District Office staff. To date, our Year Advisers have been contacting parents for students who have attendance rates below 85%. This is now being supported by Mel Bourke who will be targeting late arrivals and unexplained lateness. It would be appreciated if you would support the school with this by talking to your child and reinforcing the importance of them being on time for school, as well as on time for all of their classes.

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce you to a new staff member, as well as offer my thanks to some of our supporters from the wider community.

This term, I have employed a Dance teacher for 1 day per week. Mrs Organ is a highly qualified Dance & English Teacher and she brings with her a wealth of knowledge and experience having taught previously at Wollongong High School of the Performing Arts and Oak Flats HS. Mrs Organ will be developing new dance programs for Sport as well as working with students for potential involvement in Southern Stars in 2019. In addition to this, Mrs Organ will be working with the English Faculty to target and support students experiencing difficulty with literacy and may work to support our partner Primary schools with their dance programs.

Finally, I would like to thank some of our community partners for their support of staff and student recognition of excellence. At the end of last term, both Surfpit and the IMB supported the Principal Recognition awards by providing a voucher or account for \$50.00 to be given to the students. Leisure coast Fruit & Deli also came on board last term with a large fruit and veggie hamper to be

provided to a staff member. This was very well received and demonstrated the value that we as a school place on our teachers.



CORRIMAL F1 CADETS CLAIMVICTORY AT REGIONALS

On Tuesday September 18 a group of year 8 STEM (Science Technology Engineering & Mathematics) students made the trip to Bulli High School to compete in the regional F1 in Schools competition. This is competition where students of all ages compete in a gruelling challenge that tests their organisational, technological and construction skills. The event consists of students designing, creating and racing small scale F1 race cars made from Balsa and plastic.

These cars are designed following strict design specifications just like those present in the actual Formula 1. This requires students to think multiple steps in advance to ensure their car is always meeting the strict design guidelines. The cars are designed and manufactured using industry standard software such as AutoCAD and the cars themselves are CNC machined out of blocks.

Needless to say the challenge is quite mentally taxing and requires dedication and skill to complete. At the end of it however students have learnt to use industry standard software that they would use in Engineering or design fields, as well as learnt valuable woodworking skills. Students also had an opportunity to use industry standard machinery such as the CNC miller or 3D printer.

On the day Corrimal high students competed against numerous other schools including a private school. The hard work of our students payed off and despite being in the junior cadet bracket their car set one of the fastest track times of the day completing the track in under 1.3 seconds. Their car was more than a match for the cars of professional senior teams, who had spent in some cases over a year fine tuning the design of their cars.

Although Corrimal's "Legendary Racing team" won the Cadet bracket, both of our teams performed well on the day and will be going to the next stage of competition. We look forward to seeing how our Cadets do at the state level and wish them the best of luck.

AGRICULTURE NEWS



Big things are happening in the Agriculture plot, not only do we have new chickens and alpacas we also have baby lambs! There have been three sets of twins born to our caring mothers. The first were born on the 10th of October and there is still one ewe that has not yet given birth. The 9/10 Agriculture class have been weighing and tagging the lambs so we can monitor their health. There are five baby rams and one ewe steadily gaining weight and happily frolicking in our pastures.

The alpacas are settling in nicely with Hayden Horton mastering the art of haltering. His alpaca whispering skills have allowed several classes to enjoy interacting with them. They have also had a pedicure courtesy of Darren and Dave. Thanks to Mr Brown, students in Support and Mainstream will be enjoying some pretty amazing lessons he has prepared that focus on many aspects of raising healthy and sociable alpacas.

The shearer will be arriving in the next week or so to trim up the sheep ready for the heat of summer, a new chicken coop is to be built and an aquaponics set-up is planned. It's all happening in Agriculture stay tuned!

- 5. Nurture a positive self-view


TEACHING FOR ENGAGEMENT, OPPORTUNITY AND SUCCESS
